

As a dancer, movement and the way material moves over the body inspires my work.

Stirring leaves, waves in water, the colors in the sky all evoke a play between movement light and color that I can directly lift from nature.



Inspiration

This is a painting I made on scrap fabric hanging from a wall and pinned it up by sewing it to a rusted wire I duq up from my garden, stretching it with pins







Materials

I select materials based on touch - texture color and weight are key



I generally design to the model. I can tell within a few seconds on meeting someone, not only what may look good on their build, but also how they may wear a particular style confidently





Project Planning:: Designing for the Model

Underwater Photo Shoot with Mermaid Tanya for Mermaid Parade at Coney Island I recycled a green prom dress I made: I sealed the thigh split with the slick scale material and overlayed it with the sparkly black lace bought for the project... I then attached that to the foam tail that I had designed carved and covered with the same silver scale fabric. The lace brought volume to the tail. And the silver scale sparkled in the light

For my performance projects, I design to the overall aesthetic and atmosphere I wish to evoke - here, I consider not only the performers as a whole but how a look would fit in holistically

The Yama-Yami project is multi-part.. Here, Devi, as temple dancer, calls her vahana, Lion, to her.



I then went to JP Licks to sketch out the pieces.







I decided to make a tribal-belly-dance inspired evening wear for her. It is primarily black with gold accents.





Don't Think. Just Cut



















The second piece (all materials purchased at boomerang's -cost) is something I think plays up her features and encourages jewel-tined color play.

I marked with chalk and tried out potential accessories














"Jump at de Sun!" Dresses for Haiti -25+ pillowcase dresses for Haiti (a community project), Oct-Dec 2011
